BLACK HISTORY MONTH

On the occasion of Black History Month, members were invited to listen to podcasts produced by the Canadian Labour Congress called "Smoke and Mirrors: Uncovering Truths about Human Rights in Canada". They featured conversations with some of Canada's Black thinkers and activists (<http://1944.fyi/dsDhXw>).

USW Local 1944 President Isabelle Miller was a guest speaker of the French podcast, where she shares her thoughts on how unions should play a role in ensuring more inclusivity for their members: "It is important for unions to offer sufficient mentoring opportunities, and to enable people of colour to get education and attend conferences. If a union is not inclusive of all its members, minorities won't take part in the union activities, and as a result, the union undermines itself. Unions need to reach out to people

from other cultures and tell them: 'We want you to take part in our actions'." (<http://1944.fyi/jm29Bk>)

On February 3, 2019, President Miller was a panelist at the 2019 National Black Canadians Summit in Ottawa, "Mapping Our Future – Face To Face With Our Lawmakers". She spoke on the theme 'Labour and Systemic Racism: Black in the Workplace'. The summit enabled Black communities to raise awareness about major challenges they face and to open a national conversation on ways to enhance social cohesion, inclusive and sustainable development.

On February 20, 2019, President Miller was a panelist at USW Black Labor Week, "Black Women Empowerment Seminar" in which women of colour in leadership roles spoke about the hurdles and struggles in achieving their successes.

RECIPIENT OF THE 2018 JEFFERSON AWARD FOR DISTRICT 3

USW Local 1944 wishes to extend our heartfelt congratulations to Julie Charbonneau, from Unit 51, for being recognized with an esteemed Jefferson Award. In June, Sister Charbonneau was selected as a Jefferson Award recipient for District 3, for her decades of service as a shop steward and getting others involved through community service.

Julie Charbonneau lives in Surrey, BC. An active Local Women of Steel Committee member, she volunteers twice a week at the Lookout Society, in the Greater Vancouver area, where she helps the less fortunate. She has organized several events to help the homeless and persons suffering from addiction and mental illness.

"I am very grateful to be a Jefferson Award winner," said Julie Charbonneau. "I had a wonderful time at the ceremony."

With the help of the Women of Steel, Sister Charbonneau initiated the "Share Hope" campaign in 2017 to distribute much needed amenities to Greater Vancouver's homeless. Following the day of action that was organized last December, Julie and her fellow Sister Elana Felty (Unit 51) organized two more days of action, on August 18, 2018 and November 20, 2018.

"We have done several Share Hope days of action - the key word being "we". I came up with an idea and my brothers and sisters have rallied beside me to make it happen."

"This experience for me is all part of journey of recovery I began 20 years ago. At a very dark time in my life, one of the TWU's business agents at the time — Jim Christensen, supported and encouraged me onto a path of recovery. He and I made a pact that I would rise up and turn my life around and share hope with others. I have worked the last 20 years to do this in honour of Jim."

"My sole purpose in helping others is to be an example to those who are still struggling. If I can pull myself out of the darkness, there is hope for anyone. I look forward to continue doing service work in my community and helping those who need it most. I am proud to be a member of the United Steelworkers and believe great things can happen when we are united."

The CDLC supports 60 affiliated union locals representing 44,000 members; USW Local 1944 is one of the CDLC affiliates. The Executive of the CDLC represents a cross section of local unions, which are allocated delegates based on the number of members in their union. The delegates meet monthly to discuss issues of concern to their members, get involved in the community, educate members and workers, organize workers, lobby governments, campaign for justice, take political action, and support striking workers.

WORKPLACE NEWS

STERICYCLE CERTIFICATION

In September 2018, Stericycle restructured their operations and closed their Richmond office location. The company showed how little it valued its employees by imposing unfair work conditions: If a member was not able to work from home, they stopped being employed by Stericycle. This ultimatum put our members in financial and material hardships.

In December 2018, the Union served notice to bargain a renewed Stericycle collective agreement. Meeting dates have been set for March 2019, and Local 1944 is determined to negotiate a collective agreement that is beneficial to our members.

Our Stericycle members provide 24/7 call answering services (inbound calls only) and typically take calls in health related fields for Doctors, Organ Transplant, Sick Line for Paramedics and other employers.

STRATCOM CERTIFICATION

Strategic Communications Inc. (Stratcom) management continues to enforce the job performance language in the Collective Agreement. It permits the Company to establish the minimum levels of acceptable job performance, describes how remedial training will be provided if a caller is unable to maintain those standards and outlines the minimum number of disciplinary steps to be followed if a caller is unable to achieve the minimum performance levels.

We believe that work performance should not be synonymous with constant policing by the company.

Our Stratcom members provide campaign, research, fundraising, polling and voter id services. They take calls in the non-profit sector for Environmental, Health, Human Rights, Advocacy, Labour, Professional Associations and Political clients.

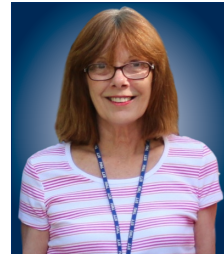
You can participate either by joining our Steel on Wheels team, by raising funds through the Virtual Rider Program, or by registering as a Crew Member or Volunteer.

"The feedback we got was very positive," said Paul Hutchinson, Chair of Unit 203. "Our members appreciated the educational content and the empowering feeling the course gave them."

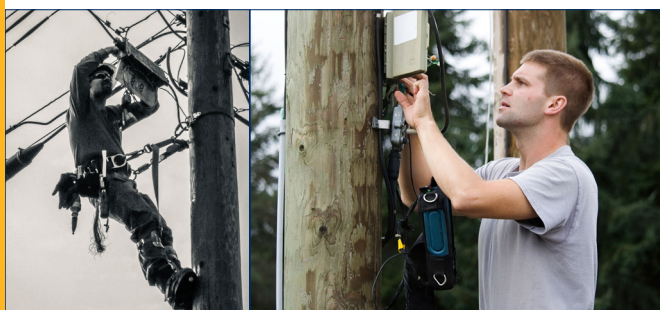
